

Celebrating 100 Years Of Scouting

To commemorate the Boy Scout Centennial, the Blue Water Council and the Port Huron Museum are partnering to present an exhibition to share local Boy Scout history. Come celebrate with current scouts, and encourage children and teens to become scouts. Discover Boy Scout history through collections of pictures, equipment, uniforms, personal recollections, patches and other artifacts. The uniforms and merit badges may have changed over the years, but the Boy Scout values have remained the same. Learn about famous and local Eagle Scouts, the National Jamboree and the opportunities scouting can offer the local youth.

Interactive components include an arcade-style shooting gallery, animal tracks identification, and a pinewood derby track. Special demonstrations will also be offered, such as "Secrets of the Pinewood Derby" and "Building a Klondike Sled."

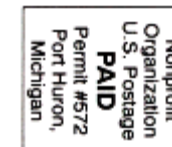

Log Cabin Adventure

Explore the early life of children in the Blue Water Area and experience what it might have been like to live in the Kammer log cabin. This 1850's authentic German log cabin was relocated to the Port Huron Main Museum's property from its original location in Casco Township. Learn about housing, transportation, clothing and toys of the past through a variety of fun hands-on activities and games.

Weather Wonders

Why does it thunder mostly in the summer? How does hail form? What makes a cloud? What's the difference between a storm "watch" and a storm "warning"? The weather is all around us. It is an important part of our lives that often controls how and where we live and what we wear. But what do you really know about the weather? Come to the Museum to learn about the wonders of weather. Participants can make a cloud, produce lightning and create a tornado. This interactive program will provide an opportunity to explore weather phenomena through a variety of hands-on experiments.

Water, Water Everywhere

Did you know that water covers nearly three-quarters of Earth's surface and that 20% of

the World's fresh water is in the Great Lakes region? In a series of hands-on experiments Water Watchers can create a water system, clean up an oil spill and learn how to protect our storm drains. Participants in this fun filled program will learn about the importance the Great Lakes play in the world's fresh water supply and what we can do to keep it clean. A tour of the Main Museum's Marine Gallery will complete this program.
